Dear Bridge Friends -

Our 2022 calendar year was one for the record books! We can't wait to share why in the following pages, but for starters, we...

- Increased Foundation donations by \$224K;
- Added five new Legacy Society members, one and a half new staff members and three new Trustees;
- Graduated 500 young people, ages 11-17, from our digital beginning bridge program, "BridgeWhiz," in June and automatically enrolled them as Junior ACBL Members for a year;
- ► Established The WhizKids Bridge Club, where BridgeWhiz kids could play online for free on Shark Bridge during weekends;

- Instituted digital and hybrid online summer bridge camps using BridgeWhiz teachers;
- ► Held our first fundraiser a charity Pro-Am auction – and created a new \$54K fund named "Spark!" to fund initiatives for young people (ages 17-31);
- Financed six Junior teams to play in the Providence NABC, four of them competing for the first time;
- Fulfilled 16 grant requests— the largest number "ever," or since well before 2017;
- Created a special award honoring Mitch Dunitz for his support of collegiate bridge.

Sure ... we've given you all the highlights here, but we hope you'll read how we achieved these milestones in stories throughout the following pages.

Lastly, we want to thank Marty Bergen, author of *Points Schmoints* and many other revered bridge books, for allowing us to include some of the anecdotes he has shared with the bridge world over his career.

Tap roots go deep. Sometimes we forget who came before us with humor and sunshine to make the game grow. Interspersed in these pages are some of those "bon mots" he collected. We hope they'll help you remember your own bridge roots.

\$5,500 for booth rental and bridge educational materials needed to participate in the International Society for Technology in Education summit in Philadelphia, PA, in July 2023.

Lake Charles Duplicate Bridge Club:

\$550 for Learn Bridge in a Day?® booklets, director's fee, space rental, mini-sessions, and flyer printing in September.

Bo Han Zhu:

\$1,000 additional funding to assist in covering expenses at the Youth World Bridge Championships in Salsomaggiore, Italy, in August.

Ethan Wood:

\$1,000 additional funding to assist in covering expenses at the Youth World Bridge Championships in Salsomaggiore, Italy, in August.

Kevin Jiang:

\$9,700 for AV equipment, internet access, printing and a teacher workshop during the ABTA Annual Convention in Providence, Rhode Island.

American Bridge Teachers Association:

\$7,500 for underwriting the cost of a one-year teacher membership for those completing the face-to-face and online "Best Practices" certification.

Sorry, Partner:

\$1,500 for editing and communication software, audio recording and audience management tools to support the SORRY, PARTNER weekly podcast.

Youth Bridge Club at the Cavendish:

\$1,300 to cover the Director's Fee for 10 games during May and June, plus medals, prizes and Director stipend for the tournament.

MoKan Bridge Academy:

\$670 to purchase textbooks and handouts for the nine sessions of the Summer Youth Program during June, July and August.

Unit 169, Central Carolina Bridge Association:

\$3,750 for the "One Day-Two Cities" Learn Bridge in a Day?® beginning bridge course which covers venue rental, teaching fees and materials

United States Bridge Federation:

\$19,000 to assist in covering the travel of expenses of Youth Bridge players attending the 7th Youth World Championships in Salsomaggiore, Italy, in August.

Buffalo Bridge Center, Inc.:

\$2,450 for facility usage, mentor support, teacher stipend and educational materials to continue the Youth Bridge Education Program started in 2016.

The Magical Years Continue!

Combining the first BridgeWhiz class graduates from April with the June graduates of the Winter session, **500** students received a Certificate of Achievement, a BridgeWhiz lanyard, and a one-year free Junior membership in ACBL. The remaining group of students who attended less than 65% of classes received Certificates of Participation.

A few months prior, we recognized the need for BridgeWhiz to operate more efficiently in subsequent years. In late Spring we hired **Al Bender** as the BridgeWhiz Program Manager. You'll recall that he provided his guidance and inordinate amounts of time in that capacity during the first year. We also recognized the need for creating automation tools that would reduce the administrative overload on ACBLEF and BridgeWhiz staff for Year II.

After months of research, we decided to create a Learning Management System (LMS) for the program. This system would, among other things, address the issue of "student sign-up" versus

"student show-up" and provide a secure interaction platform between students and teachers utilizing a built-in email-system. Enrolled students would be able to learn and play the game on Shark Bridge through BridgeWhiz in a safe environment. Jerry Stamatov, an experienced LMS designer, was engaged for this project which would begin its operation in August.







In late Spring, as a test, ACBLEF posted the availability of one-week summer bridge camps, generating a lot of traffic to the ACBLEF website. Ten BridgeWhiz coaches volunteered to run a one-week digital camp without overlapping each other during the period of July 4th through August 27th at a cost of \$125 per student. Capturing students to sit behind a computer screen every day for a solid week proved to be deterrent and, with camp consolidations, only three of the seven original camps ran successfully, graduating close to 50 kids.



In partnership with the Youth Bridge Association, and with use of their website, BridgeWhiz developed the WhizKids Bridge Club to offer kids the opportunity to play for free on Sunday afternoons. A class for

parents of BridgeWhiz students was offered so that parents could learn to play bridge at the same time as their children.

Shortly thereafter, ACBLEF developed a questionnaire which it sent to the parents of BridgeWhiz students to gather information about the program and provide feedback for BridgeWhiz Year II. Bridge Whiz teachers did the same, and over the course of the summer, this working group of teachers met to address both teacher and parent concerns and recommend changes which went into effect for Year II:


In addition to hiring **Keith Hafen as Assistant BridgeWhiz Program Manager**, we tweaked the following to:

- Make the course easier and the deals more success-oriented;
- Provide free access via Shark Bridge to the WhizKids Bridge Club on weekends;
- Divide content into both static and live options;
 We divided the lessons into three 8-week modules:
 - -Module 1 is basics and play of the hand in no trump offered in Fall and Winter sessions (adding Mini-Bridge early within the module)
 - Module 2 is bidding and play of the hand in a suit – Winter session
 - Module 3 is competitive bidding and defense
 - "Improver" bridge modules in Fall and Winter

Out of an abundance of caution, we continued to administer elements of the BridgeWhiz program on the ACBLEF website while awaiting completion of the LMS, but channeled enrollment directly to BridgeWhiz.org as the official site for this new learning management system.

Further, we contacted all people who expressed an interest in becoming an ambassador during Year I through our *Join The Team* page on the ACBLEF/BridgeWhiz tab, asking them to reaffirm their interest as **volunteers**. We began an aggressive Fall recruitment campaign through

PeachJar, an online subscription "backpack" for parents of middle school students so that important messages found their way into their hands rather than remain at the bottom of a knapsack.









BridgeWhiz, Year 1, continued

At the same time, we also isolated the top ten ACBL-membership states, then overlaid the major cities where BridgeWhiz registration for Year I was the highest within those states. We created and ran a Facebook campaign for six weeks starting August 15th through the end of September promoting the opening of BridgeWhiz Year II registration and date that classes would start. It generated 13,000 visitors

to BridgeWhiz.org. Our LMS platform launched in August, but it became quickly apparent that it required more features to be in place than we had originally planned. Multiple fixes were put into place in time for Year II Fall registration and we marketed BridgeWhiz aggressively.

In late October, BridgeWhiz became a solely-owned LLC of the ACBL Educational Foundation. Sitting ACBLEF Trustees were elected as a Board of Managers and staff became joint staff members of both nonprofit organizations. The benefit of this creation was that this structure offered additional protection for Trustees by removing BridgeWhiz as a program of ACBLEF and the structure enabled the combining of both organizations for audit and IRS 990 forms.

In the final months of the calendar year, website donations to BridgeWhiz surged ahead of all others. Additionally, the Board designated BridgeWhiz to be the 2022 recipient of any contributions designated for "wherever (support) was needed most." \$18.1K donations were dedicated directly to BridgeWhiz, and since we had announced in 2021 that donations made "wherever the need is greatest" would also be ascribed to BridgeWhiz, \$151.9K was raised by 178 donors in 2022.

In closing, we are still making tweaks and adjustments to the LMS and will run the program in multiple time zones "at need" digitally during 2023. We ask that you continue to spread the word about BridgeWhiz so that its growth in 2023 as an independent nonprofit will be better than ever!

Family Affairs

Parents and grandparents are taking their BridgeWhiz kids to play in F2F games at their clubs! Here's why this is exciting:

• BridgeWhiz kids are getting the best "first partner" (and cheerleader!) they can get.



• Juniors are learning how to focus longer, and, in one club game, that meant an endurance test of 28 boards.



• ACBL members can introduce their BridgeWhiz graduate to club friends and opponents, some of whom will share their own bridge knowledge (hopefully taken in the spirit it was given) after the game is played.



 Kids are learning bridge concepts and lingo in a less stressful environment with parents or grandparents to explain these game idiosyncrasies to them.



 BridgeWhiz kids are using the ACBL Junior Membership underwritten by the ACBL Educational Foundation.

Meet Craig De Almeida and his daughter, Genevieve, a BridgeWhiz graduate, who have already played four games together at The Bridge Academy in Durham, NC. Here's what Genevieve had to say about the experience:

"It was amazing! People at the club were quite welcoming and were excited to see a new face, (well, half of one anyway, with masking and all) and made great competitors. I met people with games at my level, and quite a few who were more advanced, but everyone was quite happy explaining their bids, and I even have had to explain a few of ours a couple times. I must admit I get nervous every time, but few hands in it becomes comfortable. All in all, it's an exciting experience – even if you don't win. I'm still trying for my first masterpoints!"

Lily Steck played bridge in person for the first time ever at the Youth NABC in Providence in July after learning on BridgeWhiz last fall. The 13-year-old from Bethlehem, PA, entered the program at her grandmother, Grace Sutherland's suggestion.

"At first I was unsure, but I knew my grandma really liked it, so I thought I'd give it a try," Lily said. "And then I found out I really liked it." It took her about three weeks to get to that point.

BridgeWhiz is the ACBL Educational Foundation's nationwide online youth teaching program. Lily was in a class taught by Bernie Simkin over Zoom and Shark Bridge with about 40 kids from all over.

The BridgeWhiz program includes two tournaments, one in the middle and one at the end of the 12-week class. Lily wasn't able to participate in the final, but she won the midterm event, scoring a 74% with first-time partner Max Sullivan of Olathe, KS.

"(BridgeWhiz teachers) Al Bender and Bernie Simkin wrote glowing emails about her," Sutherland said.

"I was so excited," she said. "It's so much fun playing bridge with other kids in Rhode Island. There's nothing you can do with other kids in Pennsylvania, not in person anyway. I feel like clicking a button and staring at a screen for an hour is not really as much fun. It's still fun, but not the same."

Lily plans on taking additional BridgeWhiz classes, starting with intermediate next year. "I think my youngest cousin wants to do bridge," she said. "I think she wants to come to tournaments with me and Grandma."





Three Organizations: One Mission

We are very proud to work collaboratively with both ACBL and the American Bridge Teachers Association (ABTA) with grants that further bridge teaching, provide professional workshops, and encourage young bridge players to continue playing the best game ever! In 2022, we facilitated the following:





For ABCL:

The College Bridge Bowl

The ACBLEF normally sponsors six pairs and no teams, but travel packages were offered to pairs and teams who won in 2020 but were unable to attend due to event cancellation. Mitch Dunitz sponsored

an additional three pairs and the ACBLEF matched his donation for another three pairs. \$20K in scholarships were awarded to winning teams placing 1st through 4th place, and \$12K in scholarships were awarded in the pairs division.

The Collegiate Initiative Program

ACBLEF provided stipends of over \$8,300 to colleges starting up and maintaining bridge clubs, plus \$3,000 for books and bridge supplies.

Youth NABC

ACBLEF sponsored the \$4,000 team scholarship.

I/N Speakers at NABCs

Providing celebrity speakers to the Intermediate and Novice group is very popular, and we donate up to \$1,800 annually for teacher stipends.

LBIAD?

Since 2013, the ACBL Educational Foundation has sponsored Patty Tucker's "Learn Bridge In A Day?" events at NABC's by covering the \$1,800 presenter fee at each class.

King/Queen of Bridge

This \$2,000 annual award and college scholarship is given to a graduating high school student based on success at teaching and recruiting students to play bridge. The award is competitive and chosen by ACBLEF Trustees through blind ballot.

ACBL Digital Teacher Training Grant

Jointly sponsored by ACBL and the Educational Foundation, and in consultation with the ABTA, an initial grant of \$25,000 helped create the "how to teach" workshop. 197 ACBL teachers have now completed the course, enabling them to make online bridge lessons more engaging. This program continues to introduce teachers to apps/websites that offer unique teaching capabilities and demonstrate creative lesson dynamics.



An amazing event grew out of a weekend conversation between Tracey Bauer, Zach Grossack, and Alex Kolesnik on Memorial Day at the Sacramento Regional: an online Pro-Am auction to help cover the costs of sending 19 Junior bridge players to compete in the World Junior Bridge Federation competition in Salsomaggiore, Italy.

Within days a working group was created including Tracey, Alex, Zach, and Robert Todd, and the effort was off and running! The auction offered an opportunity to bid and play with world champions, bridge celebrities, authors and legends. It included kibitzing, an after-party with the experts, games with "The Greats" on BBO (including one hour conversations with them) and the ability to play at a mutually agreed upon time. You could even bid to play with a friend against the Pros.

A phenomenal \$53K+ was raised, enough to meet the USBF goal and then some.

The Educational Foundation saw an opportunity to create a special fund with the "then some" to help reach and develop an audience that has been traditionally hard to engage: young people ages 17-31. We named the fund "Spark!" as that is all it takes, in the form of grants, to ignite great ideas that attract and retain young adult bridge players.



Robert S. Todd, President

Considered one of the top bridge teachers in North America, Robert writes a regular article for the *ACBL Bulletin*, and has played bridge at every level from local clubs to world championships. In addition to his multiple accomplishments, Robert started teaching mathematics at university when he was 19 years old and has degrees in Physics and Mathematics (from both within the US and in Helsinki), and Political Science.

Patricia discusses everything from the beauty of bridge to numerology, just to name a few topics.


